Yale Study Leader JAY GITLIN

Jay Gitlin is Senior Lecturer in History at Yale and has taught courses on the American West, Québec and Canada, Native American history, suburbanization, and popular music. He is currently teaching "Ports, Cities, and Empires" and a class on "Yale and America." He is the author of *The Bourgeois Frontier: French Towns, French Traders, and American Expansion* and has recently agreed to write a book on beignets, coffee, and the Café du Monde for the LSU Press. He is an active pianist and bandleader and has been an on-camera commentator and consultant for several television shows on the History Channel and Connecticut Public Television.

Have you been to this region before?

I have been to New Orleans many times—both for conferences and to visit my Yale roommate and close friend Jim Babst and his family.

What makes you most excited about this program?

In my opinion, New Orleans is one of the great places in the world. The minute you arrive, you realize how strong and distinct the local culture is. Jazz and a bowl of gumbo. What could be better? Less well known: the French Quarter also has a number of excellent used bookstores, and New Orleans was a world center of opera in the 19th century.

What kind of lectures have you planned?

In my talks, I will provide some background context on the history of French North America, discuss the many meanings of "Creole," and explain why gumbo can be made with either okra (African origin) or with filé powder (Choctaw origin).

Is there anything else you'd like to share?

Soignez vous-autres. (Cajun French for "Y'all take care.")

INDEPENDENT ARRIVALS In New Orleans, Louisiana

Tuesday, March 21

After arriving in New Orleans before noon, check in at the elegant Ritz-Carlton, located in the French Quarter. Gather at 2 p.m. to walk to the Historic New Orleans Collection, where you'll experience the city's history through art. Then visit the

museum-owned Williams Residence, the only French Quarter house with its original furnishings that is open to the public. This evening, enjoy a private welcome reception, an introductory lecture, and dinner. (R/D)

NEW ORLEANS Wednesday, March 22

Take a morning visit to the BK Historic House and Gardens, a French Ouarter mansion built in 1824. Explore two hundred years of French Quarter history through the lens of the diverse families and individuals who have called this property home. Then meet a local architect for a guided walk through the French Quarter. Stop at the majestic St. Louis Cathedral and linger in Jackson Square, with its historic Pontalba Buildings, America's oldest continually rented apartment buildings. You'll also visit the bustling French Market with its tantalizing aromas of

beignets and *café au lait*. The walk concludes at Antoine's Restaurant, one of America's oldest and most prestigious familyrun eateries. Later in the afternoon, gather at the hotel, where Jay Gitlin will give a lecture. Dinner is at leisure. (B/L)

NEW ORLEANS Thursday, March 23

Join our local architect for a full-day city tour by motor coach, on foot, and by historic tram. Learn how diverse cultures have contributed to the "gumbo" of New Orleans society. Highlights include Lake Pontchartrain, Bayou St. John, and City Park, with its magnificent oak trees and sculpture garden. Stroll through a famed and mysterious above-ground



cemetery where many of the city's departed-from pirates to voodoo queensare interred. Enjoy a lunch of Creole cuisine at the famous Commander's Palace. This afternoon, our architect will guide us through the lovely, aptly named Garden District. Finish the day with an exclusive private visit to the home of local writer C. Morgan Babst (GH '03) a typical mid-19th century double-galleried townhouse. During an evening at leisure, take the historic St. Charles Streetcar to return to our French Quarter hotel. (B/L)



NEW ORLEANS Friday, March 24

Venture to the National WWII Museum, founded by eminent historian Dr. Stephen Ambrose, author of Band of Brothers. Begin with a screening of the Tom Hanksnarrated short film. Bevond All Boundaries. Then explore the museum's three-building complex at your own pace, perusing its vast collection of uniforms, weaponry, vehicles, medals, diaries, letters, artwork, photographs, and other mementos. Through first-person accounts and amazing special effects, take a journey through the war that changed the world. You may remain at the museum or wander through the city during an afternoon and evening at leisure. You will receive a voucher for lunch and a tram ticket for your return to the hotel. (B/L)

NEW ORLEANS Saturday, March 25

Today, Dr. Andrew Wegmann, a native New Orleanian and historian, will join us to share his expertise on race and society in Antebellum New Orleans. Outside the city, we will examine the complicated history of plantation life while venturing along the River Road to the restored Houmas



House, once the country's largest sugar producer, whose thousands of acres of sugarcane were worked by some 750 enslaved people. After walking amid 38 acres of lush gardens, a southern buffet lunch will be served on the grounds. Then visit Whitney Plantation, built from 1804-05, once the home of a prominent Creole family. Finish today's tour with an exclusive private visit to the 1811 Kid Ory Historic House in LaPlace, Louisiana. One of the oldest structures in St. John the Baptist Parish, this house witnessed two noteworthy moments in American history: an 1811 rebellion of enslaved people and the dawn of jazz with the birth of composer Edward "Kid" Ory in 1886. Return to New Orleans in the late afternoon, with the evening at leisure. (B/L)

NEW ORLEANS Sunday, March 26

Begin the day with a classic New Orleans jazz brunch. Then John McCusker, an award-winning photojournalist, author, and jazz historian, will lead us on a driving tour through the birth of jazz in New Orleans, relayed through the biographies and landmarks of key musicians such as Jelly Roll Morton, Kid Ory, King Oliver, and Buddy Bolden. This evening, celebrate our journey at a classic N'awlins restaurant with a festive farewell dinner and private music performance. (BR/D)
